

How to Cite Articles in Literary Criticism Books **Revised 2010**

- All of the articles in the *Contemporary Literary Criticism* and *Bloom's Modern Critical Views* are **REPRINTS** of the original articles.
- Some of the articles in *Novels for Students* are reprints. Some are written specifically for *Novels for Students*.
- You have to cite the original article AND cite the work in which you found the reprint.

Format for citing an essay that originally appeared in a scholarly journal reprinted in the CLC:

Last Name, First Name. "Title of scholarly article." *Title of journal or magazine* Volume.Issue (Date of publication): page numbers. Rpt. in (for "Reprinted in") *Name of Reference Series*. Editor's name. Volume number. City of Publication: Publisher, year of publication. Page numbers. Print.

EXAMPLE:

Staels, Hilde. "Margaret Atwood's *The Handmaid's Tale*: Resistance through narrating." *English Studies* 76.5 (1995): 455-67. Rpt. in *Contemporary Literary Criticism*. Ed. Jeffrey W Hunter. Vol. 135. Detroit: Gale Research, 2001. 46-53. Print.

Format for citing an essay that originally appeared in a book, now reprinted in CLC:

Finell, Susanna. *Unwriting the quest: Margaret Atwood's fiction and The Handmaid's Tale*. . Pullman:Washington State University, 1993. N. pag. Rpt. in *Contemporary Literary Criticism*. Ed. Jeffrey W Hunter. Vol. 135. Detroit: Gale Research, 2001. 31-40. Print.

A scholarly article reprinted in *Bloom's Modern Critical Views*:

Parker, Emma P. "Margaret Atwood." *Bloom's Modern Critical Views*. Ed. Harold Bloom. Philadelphia: Chelsea House, 200. 113-130. Print. Rpt. of "You are what you eat: the politics of eating in the novels of Margaret Atwood." *Twentieth Century Literature* 41.3 (1995): 349-367.

A scholarly article reprinted in *Novels for Students*:
