CONGRATULATIONS *CLASS OF 2022*

Members of the Byram Hills High School Class of 2022 filed into the 54th Commencement Exercises to the emotional tune of "Pomp and Circumstance," heard worldly wisdom during inspiring speeches, crossed the turf field to receive their diplomas and tossed their caps in joyful celebration.

After a high school experience marked by so many firsts during the COVID-19 pandemic, the seniors gathered one last time for graduation at the high school on June 21.

Principal Christopher Walsh declared that the students had completed their studies and were ready to face the world. "Each one of you has an unwritten story just waiting to be completed and it starts today," he said.

Valedictorian Julia Lucchino noted that many graduates have known each other most of their lives, and said that even though they've changed, sometimes change is hard to see when a label from kindergarten has stuck.

"This graduation frames an important question for all of us: Who are we? Who are we meant to be?" she said, adding: "Though we're losing some of the comforts of this tight-knit community, we have the ability to become more authentic versions of ourselves in this next phase."

Salutatorian Nora Lowe discussed time, noting she had to repeatedly rewrite the date of a chemistry test in 2020 on her calendar early in the pandemic until it finally disappeared.

"Graduates, today I challenge you to identify how you measure time, and I don't mean in the conventional way," she said. "Use it as a means to divide, remember and understand your lived experiences."

In his address, Mr. Walsh delivered life lessons derived from songs featured on faculty playlists that were played between classes. Inspired by the lyrics, he urged students to bet on themselves, take chances, be present and have no regrets.

"Please use your voices to vote and speak out for things that matter to you in this world," he said, drawing on Public Enemy's "Bring the Noise."

Superintendent Dr. Jen Lamia spoke about wonder, and reflected on earlier graduation speech themes including resiliency, adaptability and altruism.

"I do believe the only reason we grow is when we wonder," she said. "Stand up for yourselves, show kindness, reserve judgment by wondering how things are and how they can be different."

Board of Education President Scott Levy asked whether achievement is all about attaining goals and the thing that brings happiness, or whether there is more to it. He encouraged the graduates to think broadly about what achievement really means.

"Develop your own definition that incorporates the joy you derive from the journey to reach your goals and remind yourself that there are riches along the way," he said.

The seniors presented Byram Hills with the gift of a Bobcat sign above the athletic patio.

Mr. Walsh awarded the diplomas, students were congratulated by Dr. Lamia and Mr. Levy and students filled the bleachers for the triumphant cap toss.

"We will miss you," Mr. Walsh said. "You will stay in our hearts forever and thank you for letting us be part of your lives for these last four years. Go Bobcats!"

A week before graduation, the Class of 2022 came together for an amazing Senior Night. They enjoyed dinner and ice cream, played games and followed the senior tradition of painting the rock. As the sun set, they gathered on the field to take in "High School Musical 3," a fitting movie selection that was sponsored by the BHEF.

Four amazing educators were honored for their outstanding commitment to education and presented with the Teacher Recognition Award at the June 14 Board of Education meeting.

Superintendent Dr. Jen Lamia praised the recipients for being incredible learners who explore new ideas and determine what's best for their practice.

"I want to thank you for being brave," she said. "It's very easy to go in, day in and day out, and do things that you feel comfortable doing because they've been tried and true measures for you, for decades perhaps," she said. "It's another thing entirely to do something new."

Each winner was nominated by their principal.

Coman Hill Elementary School

Music teacher Emily Sabatella is a vibrant part of the school community.

Ms. Sabatella was involved in reinforcing a schoolwide initiative last year to embrace character traits that promote a kind, caring community. On her own, Ms. Sabatella created a song for each trait, and created colorful slides with the lyrics that were displayed on hallway monitors.

She assumed a major role in planning Kindness Day. Ms. Sabatella created a slideshow, collaborated with the physical education teachers for the student dance performance, and coordinated with the Technology Department to plan the sound equipment.

"Ms. Sabatella is extremely detail oriented and always considers what is best for our students," Interim Principal Karen Eldon said. "She is dedicated to her work and seeks opportunities to integrate music into Coman Hill to bring our initiatives to life."

Wampus Elementary School

Third grade teacher Suzanne Milano is a true advocate for children and is committed to helping every child achieve academic and social-and-emotional success.

COMAN HILL STUDENTS SPRINKLE KINDNESS DURING SCHOOLWIDE CELEBRATION

Good vibes and big smiles filled Coman Hill Elementary School as the school community came together to celebrate its first-ever Kindness Day.

The May 20 event was a culmination of the year's increased emphasis on social and emotional skills and a celebration of the students' many acts of kindness during the year. Along with singing and dancing on the outdoor playground, many students wore paper "Be Kind" hats and new Coman Hill T-shirts, adding to the festive atmosphere.

"It was a fantastic day for our Coman Hill community that was filled with feelgood energy," Interim Principal Karen Eldon said. "The students felt inspired and really proud of their efforts."

Mrs. Eldon said she hoped that by participating in the interactive event, students will remember the messages about kindness and put them into practice.

"I hope the assembly made a big impression on them," she said. "I want them to feel comfortable with these character traits and know they are empowered to implement them in their daily lives."

strong partnerships with school leaders.

"Wampus is such a wonderful place full of dedicated educators, faculty, staff and administrators who continually learn together to benefit the kids," Mr. Mack said. "For me to be able to lead that work is an honor."

At H.C.C., he helped create the annual #Kindness Week to foster school unity. At Wampus, he helped select a new social and emotional learning curriculum and established programs to give fifth graders more independence.

Mr. Mack's vision for Wampus is to build on the successes he achieved with his predecessor, Peggy McInerney, who became the principal at Coman Hill Elementary School on July 1.

The best part of his new job, Mr. Mack said, is the students. "It's wonderful



to see their growth as they go from third graders to being ready for middle school," he said. "My goal is to help all students become confident and independent learners."

Superintendent Dr. Jen Lamia congratulated Mr. Mack, and agreed with his belief that "the sky is the limit" for what can be achieved at Wampus.

"We have so much faith in you and what you're going to be able to accomplish at Wampus," she said. "You have fidelity to this organization that is unparalleled. I am so thrilled to see you at this juncture."



What's a great way to find out what middle school students want to make their school the best place to learn? Let them pitch the ideas themselves.

H.C. Crittenden Middle School seventh graders who participated in the Shark Tank Student Directed Learning class this past school year came up with innovative ideas: new structured games for recess, an outdoor classroom, and enrichment activities like master class instruction, a stock market game and an art day.

While Shark Tank began as a competitionstyle experience to find the best project to enhance the school community, the students' ideas fit with the school's vision and all of them will be implemented during the coming school year.

"Our students did a phenomenal job assessing the needs of our community, developing their ideas in Shark Tank and creating video pitches," Principal Kim Lapple said. "We felt it was important to honor these really great ideas and give students in middle school the opportunity to feel empowered as they see their ideas come to fruition."

Seventh grade social studies teacher Stacey Iskovitz oversaw Shark Tank, where students worked in small groups and collaborated on their projects.

"Students were motivated by seeing a need for something, and this class gave them a tangible way of having input," she said. "The students were so enthusiastic and excited their voices are being heard. They also loved the feeling that they are making a contribution that will be here beyond their years at H.C.C."

Two pitches are being funded through the generosity of the Byram Hills Education Foundation.

One is for an outdoor ping pong table, which will be located in an updated courtyard area. The school will provide other games including cornhole, foosball and chess tables.

"We're going to develop this courtyard into an area that allows students to enjoy lunch, enjoy company and enjoy structured recreational opportunities," Ms. Lapple said.

The second is for 25 Crazy Creek chairs, which are portable outdoor seats. Teachers will be able to sign up to use the chairs and bring their classes outside to do schoolwork.

The other suggestions will become options available this coming year during the Student Directed Learning period. They are: inviting experts in the community to teach master classes, a stock market game in which students will "invest" a mock currency called H.C.C.-coin and track their weekly progress, and an art day so students can decorate the school.

The seventh graders in Shark Tank enjoyed working together and appreciated the freedom to explore solutions.

Emma Dallas and Amelina Milio pitched the ping pong table. "It's something new and fun to do outside," Emma said.

Another group pitched the outdoor chairs so students don't have to sit on the grass or rocks. "We wanted kids to be able to learn outside more comfortably," Kayla Wee said.

"We had fun while trying to create the idea and when we were making our presentations, we were able to use our creativity and combine all of our ideas together," Kayla said. "I learned that you have to take everyone's idea into consideration."

Brett Kaplan, Jack Levy, and Darby Schlosser enjoyed the process of pitching the master classes as a way to allow students to learn about topics outside of the curriculum. "I liked how we could be very creative and express our ideas and really contribute something to the school," Darby said.

Ms. Lapple is grateful for the partnership with the BHEF, and the students. "We invested in their ideas because they invested in H.C.C."

STARTUP: STUDENTS TO BECOME ENTREPRENEURS IN NEW COURSE AT BYRAM HILLS HIGH SCHOOL

Byram Hills High School is preparing to nurture the next generation of entrepreneurs.

StartUp, a new elective starting this fall, is an interdisciplinary, full-year course that can be taken by juniors and seniors for one or two years. Students will undertake all of the steps of creating a real startup business or nonprofit social enterprise, running their venture and trying to be successful.

The class is a place for students to develop their passions, adopt an entrepreneurial mindset, work with industry experts, and experience what it's like to learn from their mistakes. Students will practice pitching their startups and compete for funding.

Over the years, Byram Hills students have launched businesses on their own; this course gives them a supported place to create them at school.

"We know there are students really craving the opportunity to develop their own businesses but might not have the ability to do that in a typical high school schedule," Principal Christopher Walsh said. "StartUp will allow those students to be creative, innovative and collaborative and to actually work as entrepreneurs in a way that limits the risks but maximizes the rewards. They will get to experience what it's like to create something from scratch."

Thanks to a generous grant from the Byram Hills Education Foundation, teachers and administrators participated in professional development throughout the 2021-2022 school year that allowed them to explore the program and plan the curriculum. The mathematics and social studies departments will oversee the course.

An exciting part of the class is community involvement. Parents, community members and alumni with business expertise may volunteer to be a coach who will teach a classroom lesson, a mentor who will give regular feedback to students, or an advisory board member who will hear funding pitches and offer advice.

"These are three meaningful ways that entrepreneurs and business leaders from our community can help our students succeed and contribute to the program," Deputy Superintendent Dr. Tim Kaltenecker said.

StartUp is the latest example of the Byram Hills High School's commitment to offering courses that reflect students' interests, teach practical skills and are valued by colleges and the workforce.

"We are creating courses that are culminating experiences for students to really apply their learning," Dr. Kaltenecker said. "StartUp will give them the real-world skills they'll need when they graduate as well as launch them in a real way and prepare them to be the leaders we want students to be when they leave Byram Hills."

Dr. Andrew Taylor, the District's Director of Technology and Professional Learning, said the course complements other classes at the high school and will be a great option for students with varied interests.

"This course is for everyone," he said.
"It could be for the artist who wants to
run their own studio or for someone who
has a product that they want to create. It
could be for a student creating a piece of
technology or for that social entrepreneur
who has an idea for how to change the
world."

Through this first-of-its-kind class, students are excited to be gaining hands-on experience that will help them in college and the workplace.

Rising senior Nick Ishkanian is hoping he'll learn how to make new professional connections and grow his four-year-old sneaker wholesaling business.

"It's successful now but I'm wondering if the class can help me take it up a notch," he said. "I'm really interested in entrepreneurship. I'm so happy the school is starting to offer business classes."

Katie DeGeorges, another rising senior, is looking forward to learning about business. "The class is letting me branch out into entrepreneurship, which is something I definitely want to see in my future."

As the budding entrepreneurs explore new ways of doing things in the world, it's possible that the next blockbuster business might be hatched in the classroom.

"Students are in a unique position because they have the vision to see the future differently than adults do," Mr. Walsh said. "This class will nurture innovative ideas and will be an incubator for what could be the next great company, which is thrilling for our school and our students."
